Community Youth Holiday Event – December 12, 2013

This was the 15th year for this traditional Hazel Dell holiday event for kids in our community. It was held on Thursday, December 12 from 6 to 8 PM at Sarah J. Anderson Elementary school. The event was sponsored by the NE Hazel Dell neighborhood association and Three Creeks Community Partners. Over 300 kids attended with their parents, friends and other family members.

The highlight this year was the Pioneer Choir performance of classic holiday songs. Led by music teacher, Linda Wear, this was their first performance of the new choir at Sarah J. Anderson Elementary school. Ms. Wear was teaching music at Chinook Elementary last school year and moved to Sarah J.



Anderson to start a music program this last fall. Approximately 30 students from the choir performed before parents and fellow students.

This year Waste Connections donated 41 bikes/helmets to be raffled off to kids in need of a bike. The children who received bikes were very appreciative and happy to receive this gift. Thanks to Waste Connections for this donation.

Metro Toy Drive provided a donation of 200 toys which were distributed to families in need in our area. Gene & Heather Schwindeman, Blind Onion Pizza, brought and gifted approximately 60 sports balls to kids at the event. Goodwill Job Connections brought over 1,000 children's books of which many were given out during the event.

Yard & Garden land donated 6 Christmas trees. These were raffled off at the end of the evening to families in need of a Christmas tree and included decorations.

Chuck's Produce, new to our community, donated 11 cases of fruit. Safeway and Fred Meyer together donated another 10 cases of fruit. This time of year many of the kids don't get fresh fruit and bags of fruit were distributed at the event and through the Back Pack program at the school. Total of 55 boxes of food were distributed to needy families prior to and after the event. Thanks to the Sunshine Division, Clark County Food Bank and the individuals/businesses that donated food boxes.

Ronald McDonald made an appearance and greeted kids during the event. Refreshments were provided during the event by McDonald's, Burgerville and Starbucks Coffee. McDonald served orange drink and over 800 freshly baked chocolate chip cookies. Burgerville served hot chocolate and Starbucks Coffee Hazel Dell provided coffee.

Thanks to Hazel Dell U'Haul and Salmon Creek Storage for their truck and storage unit donations. The toys are stored prior to the event and then transported to the event.

Most of all, thank you to the approximately 100 people who volunteered to help organize and made this a successful event. Several Spanish interpreters helped translate during the party.

Highway 99 Street Signal Improvements

Many of you probably have noticed the work underway along highway 99

from NE 63rd Street to NE 119th Street. Work is also happening on NE 78 Street from NE Hazel Dell Avenue to NE St. Johns Road. Contractors are laying cable as part of Clark County Public Works project to update the traffic signals along these routes.




Several intersections will receive new signal lights and some intersections will have their sidewalks widened to accommodate new signal boxes.

Once completed, this upgrade will improve signal communications and help traffic flow along these corridors.

Pets in Clark County

(Note from the Editor: Hazel Dell is in unincorporated Clark County and not within the City of Vancouver therefore County Ordinances apply regarding pets)

It happened again today. A plea came in from a citizen asking for help regarding a Pomeranian/ Chihuahua mix. Answering a Nickel Ad for two puppies, an interested party made an appointment to go see the pups. Given the asking price and what the potential dog owner could afford for on-going costs and the physical constraints of her home, she knew she could only afford one of the pups.



Her plea was asking Clark County Animal Protection & Control to go get the second pup due to the deplorable living conditions the Nickel Ad reader found when she did buy just the one puppy. "Is there any way you can get in that house and get that puppy out of there, TODAY?"

"Yes" is the answer, thanks to licensing revenue obtained when you buy your dog or cat tag each year. This is an unfortunate but all too common question received each month by the County staff of Animal Protection & Control. The County has been asked to handle coyotes, snakes, goats, alpacas, even a dead 1-ton bison. Clark County spent last year about \$15,000 on spay/neuter grants, and would love to increase that 10x to meet demand.

Your licensing dollars go a long way to improving life here in Clark County for both you and the animals we love to call pets. **Please license your dogs and cats, as it is the law,** and the program is called upon to help with the most amazing circumstances.

Spay & Save Program

The *Humane Society for Southwest Washington* has a program to reduce the number of unwanted cats in our community. In 2012 the Humane Society received a total of almost 4,000 cats. About 4 out of 5 cats received are intact. Through the Spay and Save program they have altered 2,222 cats in 2012 and 2013.

What impact will this campaign have to save pets' lives? An un-spayed female, her mate and all of her offspring, producing 2 litters per year, with 2.8 surviving kittens per litter by year 8 would result in over 2 million cats in Clark County. By spaying and neutering just one male and one female cat, more than 2,000 unwanted births can be prevented in just four years. In Clark County there are approximately 70,000 feral cats.

The *Spay & Save* is a Portland metro area-wide program aimed to assist low income families by offering spay and neuter surgeries for stray or feral cats for as low as \$10 or even free. Safe Kids Clark County

Nearly 3,000 children per year are fatally injured at home. Safe Kids Clark County urges parents to childproof homes.

Approximately 2,700 children in the United States, ages 14 and under, die from accidental injuries in the home each year. Around 80 percent of these deaths were among children ages 4 and under. Most fatal injuries at home are caused by fire, suffocation, drowning, choking, falls, poisoning or firearms discharged unintentionally.

Safe Kids Clark County urges parents and caregivers to check their homes for basic safety precautions. The first step in childproofing a home is to explore every room at a child's eye level. Literally get down on your hands and knees and crawl around. Anything that can fit through a standard 1½-inch toilet paper tube is a potential choking hazard. Of course, cleaning products, medications, alcohol, firearms and other potentially harmful products need to be stored out of reach and locked up.

Additional recommended safety precautions:

- Test your smoke alarms every month. Change the batteries at least once per year.
- Always supervise children while they're in the bathroom and

follow other important safety guidelines.

- Install a self-closing and self-latching gate around the home swimming pool.
- Look at every room as your child would. Ask yourself what looks interesting and what can be reached.
- Always supervise young children while they're eating. To avoid choking, don't allow children under age 3 to eat small, round or hard foods, including hot dogs, hard candy, nuts, grapes and popcorn.
- Prevent serious falls. Keep furniture away from windows, install guards or stops on windows that are not emergency exits, install safety gates at the top and the bottom of stairs.
- Avoid exposing children to potential poisons. Lock up potential poisons out of children's reach.
- Install carbon monoxide detectors in the basement at least 15 feet from fossil-fuel burning appliances and every sleeping area. Be sure to test detectors every month.
- Keep emergency numbers by every telephone. Call 911 if a child is choking, collapses, can't breathe or is having a seizure. If you suspect a child has been poisoned, call 1-800-222-1222.
- Check your first aid kit to make sure it is fully stocked. Make sure babysitters know where to find first aid supplies and how to handle an emergency.

WATER H₂O

At our November meeting Bev Walker, a Water Educator with the

City of Vancouver Water Resource Education Center spoke about our most valued natural resource "WATER".

We have an abundance of water here in the Northwest however many parts of the United States are not as fortunate and pay dearly for water.

For instance, of the 100% of water available to us on Earth 3% is tied up in plants, trees, moisture and animals; 97% is salt-water; 2.4 % is frozen; .06% is impure fresh water; that leaves 0.003% pure and drinkable water. Here in Clark County we get our clean drinking water from aquifers.
