Neighborhood Association March and April 2014 Meeting Recaps

At the March 18th meeting we had guest speakers from the Backyard Bird Shop and the Clark County Beekeepers Club.

Backyard Bird Shop

Debi Kapral, owner of the Vancouver store, gave a very interesting and informative talk on local birds and their feeding and nesting habits. She also gave a quick overview of the shop's products. Attendees were treated to several hand-outs and a bag of Black Oil Sunflower seeds.

Clark County Bee Keepers Club

Charles Bennett, an avid beekeeper, gave us the sweet lowdown on what makes bees be bees. There are three types of bees in a hive or swarm:

Workers, Drones and a Queen. Worker bees can number in the thousands and they can and will sting if alarmed. Bees gather flower nectar and process it into honey for their food. Out of 100 beekeepers about 95% are hobbyist and 5% are commercial.

At the April 15th meeting we had guest speakers from the American Red Cross and the Magenta Theater.

Red Cross

Marni Harrington, Red Cross Volunteer Recruitment Representative, shared with us all the activities of the Red Cross. We learned that they support military families being able to contact service people on active duty when there is a family emergency requiring them to come home. They are in need of volunteers to help with the Blood Donation program.

Magenta Theater Company

Jaynie Roberts, Magenta Theater Artistic Director, shared the history of the Theater Company, formed in 2002 and the need for volunteers to help with the creation of the stage props for the plays. They are scheduled to hold six plays this year and rely on volunteers to paly parts and support the company, which is non-profit.

Serving Safe and Healthy Foods at Private Community Events



Community gatherings such as neighborhood block parties or BBQ's, office

parties, church potlucks or family events bring people together to share great food. These events are considered private as they are restricted, not open to the general public and food is provided without compensation. Food licenses and permits are not required for these types of "private events."

Safe food handling is always important when groups of people are fed at community events. To increase safety

for your event we'd recommend that all food handlers get a food worker card. It's easy and it's online www.foodworkercard.wa.gov

Start Out Right

- Make sure all cooks and volunteers know the basics of food safety.
- Always work with clean hands
- Regularly wash cutting boards, knives, countertops and utensils with hot soapy water
- Cook food to recommended safe internal temperatures
- Never partially cook food and finish later
- Prepare food close to serving time
- Avoid cross contamination (keep raw meats away from ready - to - eat foods)
- Keep cold food cold (at or below 40 F)
- Keep hot foods hot (at or above 140 F)
- Throw uneaten served food away after 2 hours

Be Food Safe! Prepare with Care

CLEAN. Wash hands, utensils, and surfaces often
 SEPARATE. Don't cross contaminate
 COOK Use a food thermometer
 CHILL. Chill food promptly and in shallow containers

Identity Theft: Identify theft is a growing problem across the US. Criminals use personal information such as your date of birth and social security number to pose as you for illegal gains. You can protect yourself

by not carrying important numbers or passwords with you. Report stolen credit cards immediately. Review your monthly financial statements and check your consumer credit report annually for fraudulent charges. Pick up your mail daily or have it held at the post office. Shred paperwork with your important information on it. Do not put your credit card number into unsecured websites.
